Student Science Writing Competition 2012

The Nova Scotian Institute of Science (NSIS), in collaboration with the Situating Science Cluster (Halifax), is sponsoring the NSIS 2012 Science Writing Competition. There are two categories of entries: the preparation of a scientific article by a graduate student and an article prepared by an undergraduate student. The winning articles will be featured on both the NSIS and Situating Science Cluster websites. The authors of the winning science papers will also be invited to submit their paper for publication in the *Proceedings of the Nova Scotian Institute of Science*.

SCIENCE WRITING: A prize of \$500 will be awarded for the best article written by a graduate student and a prize of \$250 for the best article from an undergraduate student at Nova Scotia University on a topic of science including:

- A presentation of original scientific research,
- A review of the literature in a scientific field that provides a new analysis or perspective on science and/or its application
- An article directed to a non-specialist audience on some aspect of science and its application.

Articles should not exceed 5 - 6 pages (including tables and figures; 3200-3900 words)
