Canadian Marathon Canoe Championships 2004

The 2004 Canadian Marathon Canoe Championships, hosted by the Nova Scotia Marathon Canoe Association, were held in Dartmouth Nova Scotia from Aug.19-22. With co-operation from the Atlantic Division of the CCA, the Nationals were held on the Dartmouth Lakes, long recognized as a prime location for national and international paddling events.

Ninety paddlers participated, representing 6 provinces, 4 states and 7 age classes from bantam to Masters III. Race conditions proved favourable with the rains and heavy winds making their presence known only during the nights.

The race venue, consisting of 3 lakes and a 1 km canal, provided four distinct courses, each of which were tailored to an appropriate age and race class.

The Seniors and Masters I competed on a 22 km course with two 480 m portages; Masters II and III were spared the portage over a 20.5 km route where as Juvenile, Junior, Sea Kayak and Stock paddled 18 km with a 100 m portage. The Bantam, Recreation, Adult / Youth and North Canoes paddled 2 laps of Lake Banook for 5 km.

The event was focused on Lake Banook where existing infrastructure (judges tower, office space, boats, accommodations, etc) were all readily available and close at hand.

The Saturday night banquet and awards ceremony, attended by 120 paddlers and friends, was held in the historic Banook Canoe Club on the shores of Lake Banook. An evening of comradery, good food, music and draw prizes was enjoyed by all.

With support from corporate sponsors, municipal and provincial gov'ts, the CCA, local paddling clubs and associations and many dedicated individuals, the event, 2 years in the planning, proceeded smoothly and efficiently. The organizing committee wish to thank all who helped and participated for making the event a success!

Fischer was seen on our TV screens powerfully stroking the German Women's K-4 crew to an exciting win. The rest of the story though may even be of more interest. I have been told that the venerable Birgit had to beat out a young 17 year old girl for the final seat in that K-4. A tough task indeed. The girl she beat out....... was her own daughter. The Rivi: every September the Burloak club holds a 4KM all-comers race on their Sixteen Mile Creek. You race in either C-1 or K-1 and you get to negotiate a handicap with race organizer Scott Oldershaw. Don't expect to pull a fast one on Scott who has records and times for twenty plus years and slots you in where only he believes you should be. The race starts with the person deemed to be the slowest and the others are stagger-started thereafter in order of ability. The first to the finish line, in spite of total race time, is declared the champion. This year, the Masters prevailed to take home the trophies. Jason Perry won the C-1 and Rich Carson the K-1. The fastest time of the day went to young buck, Adam Oldershaw, who for that great effort only got an honourable mention.

The Guts and Glory award: if there was such an award for the Rivi race, it would have gone to master Kevin Nicholson who has previously only been known as the father of multi CCA medallist Mallory. Kevin, paddling in his daughter's Simon River C-1, was doing well until going into the half-way turn. There in the heavy traffic he took the turn too wide and while trying to avoid beaching upon the shoreline, he was flung out the side of the boat. No quitter, Kevin swam his boat to shore, adjusted his block and got back in the race. Trying to close the gap that had now opened between him and the field, Kevin leaned heavily into the paddle forcing his every muscle into the task. His paddle suddenly snapped at the shaft and into the water he went again. Our Grizzly Adams then swam to shore for the second time that day, climbed up through the poison ivy of the steep embankment to go to the club to get another paddle. A young boy standing nearby exclaimed to his father: "I want to be like him, Dad." When Kevin got back in his boat he raced proudly to the finish line only to find that the officials' table had been packed away and the bar-b-que and back-slapping were well under way back at the clubhouse





Including people with a disability in paddling programs?

Chantal Petitclerc, Kirkby Côté, Benoît Huot, Chantal Benoît, Jeff Adams...Do these names sound familiar?

Yes, these high-performance athletes were all medallists at the 2004 Athens Paralympic Games. At some point in their life, they were included in a sport. They took advantage of it and achieved great things with their own potential.

During the past twenty-five years, sports for people with a disability have been developed at many levels in Canada. Specific programs for people with a disability have been put in place by various sport organisations. Canada was a great leader in promoting accessibility and inclusion of people with a disability. Now, Canadians are more aware of the various disabilities and are able to adapt their recreational and sport programs accordingly. It has been demonstrated that practicing physical activity or being involved in a sport is empowering for people with a disability.

Many sports are very well organised at both the National and International level (eg. Swimming/ Wheelchair Basketball/ Track and Field). However, not all sports are yet delivering programs for this specific population. The Canadian Canoe Association, as the National governing body for the sport of canoe and kayak, has had a strategic objective for a number of years to advance the participation for people with a disability. The entire Association is willing to become pro-active in this area because it would ultimately have a significant effect upon all member clubs. National sprint organizations have a responsibility to deliver quality program for all Canadians including persons with a disability.

The sport of canoeing presents some real opportunities to advance in this area. It is possible to adapt paddling programs and include people with a disability. The example of the British Canoe Union (BCU) is a great one for the growth of our sport. The BCU now includes races for people with a disability during the British National Championships. The Brits also have a structure in place with Regional Coordinators located across the United Kingdom as contact persons. They took a great lead so far.

Like the BCU, the CCA could become a leader in the area of developing programs for people with disability and make a real difference for our sport in Canada and in your community.

RULE CHANGES AT 2005 CCA AGM

Once again, 2005 is a competition rule change year for the Sprint Canoe discipline of the Association. Clubs should now be thinking of putting together rule changes they think will be beneficial to the Association. The deadlines for the submission of rule changes are the same as in previous years. The CCA-Sprint rules stipulate that submissions for rule changes must be submitted in writing to the CCA National office no later than 60 days in advance of the CCA AGM. Therefore, for 2005, the deadline is March 8th. The Domestic Development Committee of the Association has its scheduled winter meeting on January 21st and 22nd. Proponents of rule changes are encouraged to submit their proposals to the DDC for review and comment if they want to improve the chances of their proposals being ratified at the AGM.

SPORT CANADA BACKS CCA's ABORIGINAL PADDLING INITIATIVE

The Sprint Racing Discipline of the CCA has received one of the largest grants ever made to a national sport organization for its Aboriginal paddling initiative. Minister Owen announced the support in September of a 4 year contribution totalling \$384,000. These funds are earmarked to improve the accessibility of Aboriginal Canadians to sprint canoe kayak paddling. The success of the application was in large part due to CCA's building of a coalition of support including the Canada Games Council and the Aboriginal Sport Circle. One of the first activities was an Aboriginal Paddling Conference held in Montreal on November 20th and 21st. Representatives from across Canada attended. They shared ideas and compared notes as to the most effective way to achieve CCA's goals. The next edition of Paddles Up will include an article on the results of the conference. CCA is the Top National Sport Organisation in Canada

OTTAWA - The Coaching Association of Canada announced today that former diving coach Donald Dion of Montreal, Dana Dickinson of Tracey Mills, N.B., and the Canadian Canoe Association won its major awards for 2004. In addition, Canadian gymnastics coach Kelly Manjak of Calgary was announced as the recipient of the Jack Donohue "Coach of the Year" Award, which is presented annually by the Canadian Professional Coaches Association.

The Canadian Canoe Association is the first recipient of the IgniteTM "Outstanding National Team Performance" Award. It is awarded to a national sport federation in recognition for outstanding performances by its national team during the past year. Canadian paddlers performed brilliantly at the Olympic Games led by Adam van Koeverden's gold and bronze in men's kayak and a bronze for Caroline Brunet in women's kayak.

The Petro-Canada Coaching Excellence Awards were also announced. They are presented to coaches whose athletes won medals over the past year at open world championships, Olympic Games, Special Olympics World Games, or Paralympic Games. Scott Oldershaw, double Olympic medallist Adam van Koeverden's personal coach and, Frédéric Jobin, coach of Caroline Brunet will both receive this award.

NEWS FROM THE ICF CONGRESS!!!

- -The focus of the ICF will be to improve C-boat participation in both flatwater and slalom.
- -Canada submitted a letter to the ICF and Host Organizing Committee requesting that the Women's C-1 and C-2 events be included as exhibition events on the 2005 World Championship Program.
- -Pre World Junior Slalom Championships will be hosted in Solkan, Slovakia on July 9-10 2005.
- -World Dragon Boat Championships will be held in Casteldefells, Barcelona in June of 2005.
- -Canada has been lobbying for a number of years to increase the number of racing opportunities for U-23 teams. In the past years, Canada has asked the permission to participate in the European U-23 Championships. Once again, the European Canoe Association decided they would keep the U-23 Championships a "closed competition" for the next four years. The President of the Association encouraged CCA to write a letter requesting that Canadian be permitted to race exhibition at the 2005 European U-23 Championships.
- The ICF Board of Directors recently passed a by-law that requires all Standing committees to have at least one female member on the committees.
