PAST - CELEBRATING FORTY YEARS

Metro Association has been in existence since 1968. It has been the coordinating body for the local clubs during all of that time consistently encouraging cooperation between its member clubs. Each season brings special memories from times past.

For several years the first special of the New Year was the January Jig sponsored by Metro and featuring all available local callers. Its most memorable location was at the Dalhousie University Club with its high ceiling laced with dark beams and banners. During the Dartmouth Winter Carnival, the Stardusters organized dancing on the ice or in the snow at Graham Grove Park immediately followed by their Bean Bash. This later evolved into the Sweetheart Dance. In March the Hal Dar Swingin' Stars held their 3/4's Dance on Saint Patrick's. One year we came out to find a foot of snow had fallen during the dance. April brought the Scotia Dancer's Spring Fling at Charles P. Allen High School with an afternoon workshop, supper and evening dance which filled the gym with 35 squares. Metro organized the First Year Roundup and Atlantic Jamboree in May with a few memorable visiting callers: Earle Parke broke his ankle when he jumped off the stage to demonstrate a move and was back later to call, Stan Burdick was editor of American Square Dance and the artist of Do-Ci-Do Dolores, Vaughn Parish came from Colorado with his smooth western style, Dick Fleming and later Don Moser both came from Quebec. The round dancers combined forces for a Parade of Rounds often featuring an Easter Bonnet competition. Later the Fun Squares Apple Crisp and Coordinators Sail Into Summer Plus dances occupied the late Spring weekends.

Metro has sponsored Summer Dances for years attempting to maintain the interest of new dancers. The early dances were held in front of Eaton's in the Halifax Shopping center. A highlight was dancing to Dick Leger from Rhode Island calling and playing his guitar.

Autumn came with the Tartan Twirler's Fall Round Up at Southdale School to various visiting callers, and later the Lake City Swingers' Swing Into Fall with Stu Brink, then Gerry O'Hara, and recently to live music with Dottie Welch. Many Maritime Conventions were held in Halifax – 1000 dancers filling all the ballrooms at the Lord Nelson, later the Port Royal and Mariner rooms at the World Trade and Convention Centre, and then at the Nova Scotian Hotel. For several years the Bee Square's held a Christmas Dance for class and club with Herb Muir calling in the cafeteria at NSIT. Metro New Year's Eve Dances have been held in many locations including St. James Church, Cole Harbour Place and St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, but the most memorable were those in the early 1970's held in the ballroom of the Lord Nelson Hotel under the crystal chandeliers.

In 1982 the 3rd Canadian National Square and Round Dance Convention was held in Halifax and its sponsoring body was Metro because the Provincial Federation had not been formed in 1978 when the bid was made. With over 5000 dancers this was definitely a highlight of Metro's 40 years. We also assisted admirably with the National in 1994 when we "Danced By the Shore". In the summer of 1987 and again in 1999 Metro hosted the Provincial Festival at Mount Saint Vincent University. Festival 2007 was held at Cole Harbour Place as a fund raiser for Halifax National Festival 2010. Dance attire was available locally from the Grand Square Shop run by Ches and Ferne Knowlton, followed by John and Fran Essex, and then Ed and Lil LeBlanc. Later Debbie and Harry George ran George's Western Wear.
